The Nursing AAS program provides a sound foundation in both the theoretical principles of nurse caring and the clinical foundations of nursing practice. Students have varied opportunities in many different health care environments during their clinical practice in the program and, therefore, graduates of the program are prepared to begin employment in a variety of health care settings as entry level professional nurses.

The Program is approved by the New York State Board of Education and is accredited by the

Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing, Inc. (ACEN). This is a prestigious national

accreditation that insures a quality program of study. Students completing the program are eligible

Additional Information:**I. Admission Information**

- Students requesting admission into the Nursing Program must submit a separate Supplemental Nursing Application. Applications will be accepted between January 1st and February 1st for Fall consideration and between February 1st and March 1st for Spring consideration. Beginning with the students applying to the Nursing Program for January, all students applying to the Nursing Program at SUNY Adirondack will be required to complete a HESI A2 exam. This test will be able to be scheduled in the Testing Center at SUNY Adirondack or a Prometric Test Center. The results of the HESI A2 Nursing Admissions Test will be valid for two calendar years, and students must pass the exam for admissions consideration. The cost of this admissions test will be the responsibility of the student.
- A GPA of 2.8 or better is required to enter the Nursing Program.
- Students admitted to the nursing program must be 18 years of age or older before the first day of class.
- All applicants must be eligible to enter college level Math and English courses as determined by the placement test, or have earned college level Math and English credit.
- A grade of C+ (77) is required in all nursing courses for the AAS in Nursing and in BIO 107, BIO 108, and BIO 223. Grades below C+ (77) in the above courses cannot be used to fulfill the program requirements.
- Students have up to two attempts to receive a C+ or greater in BIO 107, BIO 108, and BIO 223. Students who fail a course of C+ or better within the past five years of being accepted into a nursing cohort, will be eligible to re-enroll in the course. Successful science course completions prior to admittance into the Nursing AAS program, will remain valid for re-enrolled students in the Nursing AAS program.
- Admission in this program is conditional upon meeting all college and hospital specific requirements. Requirements are limited to: annual physical examination in which the provider attests to the student's ability to care for patients in a clinical setting; documented proof for all vaccination requirements; TB testing; Healthcare Provider CPR certification (demonstration); current nursing student malpractice insurance; completion of felony conviction in the past five years; medical insurance; and completion of criminal background check in CastleBranch. All items must be completed by August 1 for fall cohort & January 3 for spring cohort. Students not meeting the requirements will be required to complete the requirements before being accepted into the program.

8. All students admitted to the Nursing Program must attend a mandatory Nursing Program Orientation. All nursing students will be given a Student Nursing Handbook which contains important Nursing Program policies. The handbook will be reviewed with the students. All students are required to sign the final page of this handbook acknowledging they have received and understood the policies that they are bound to as a nursing student at SUNY Adirondack. The handbook will be kept in the student files and acknowledges understanding of the policies outlined in the handbook as part of this contract.
9. All students admitted to the nursing program must attend the cohort registration informational session (for cohort registration) and the Nursing Program Orientation (traditional students) or register and take the nursing program entrance exam (LPN/Transfer students) prior to the start of the semester entering the nursing program. During the first semester of the course, students will receive the HSD Nursing Student Handbook – it includes the nursing specific policies and procedures. The faculty will review the Handbook with the students and students will be expected to sign the acknowledgment form they have received and understood the policies that they are bound to as a nursing student at SUNY Adirondack. The form acknowledges the student’s understanding of the policies outlined in the Handbook and confirms their acceptance of the contract. The form will be kept in the student Nursing file.

Admission and continuation in this program are conditional upon annual physical examination in compliance with the student’s ability to care for patients in the hospital setting; maintaining currency with all vaccines, including CPR, and nursing student malpractice insurance; and remaining in compliance with the policies and procedures of the SUNY ADK Student Handbook and the Health Sciences Division Nursing Student Handbook. Form must be signed by a Health Sciences Specialist in the Health Sciences Division office. Students not in compliance will not be allowed in the program and will receive an unsafe for the clinical experience missed.
10. A deferment from acceptance into the Nursing Program is only granted for extenuating circumstances. To qualify for a deferment, you must submit a request PRIOR to the start of the semester that you are requesting the deferment. A deferment is only given for one (1) academic semester and only one (1) time. If a student does not return to the program after the completion of their deferment terms, they will be removed from the list and the student will need to re-apply to the Program for future consideration.

IA. Supplemental Admission Information for Graduates of Practical Nursing Programs

1. Graduates of practical nursing programs may be granted advanced standing in the Nursing Program. A minimum GPA of 2.8 or higher is needed for entry if enrolled in college courses. Applicants must be eligible for admission to the Nursing Program and have a “C+” or better in BIO 107 in two attempts or less, within the past five years of being accepted to the program. LPN students who receive advanced placement in the Nursing Program and credit for NUR 100 will be required to take the one-day noncredit LPN Transition Course that will be offered prior to the start of the entering cohort. The cost for this course will be set by the college and will be the responsibility of the student. Satisfactory completion of the LPN Transition Course is required for LPN students to receive credit for NUR 100 and advanced placement in the Nursing Program. Students may complete the Nursing program in 4.5 semesters from enrollment in the first nursing course.

IB. Supplemental Admission Information for Students from another Accredited Nursing Program

1. Students, with prior enrollment from another accredited nursing program, wishing to transfer into the Nursing Program must meet the 2.8 GPA to enter the Nursing program and have a grade of C+ (77) or better in BIO 223, and any transfer nursing courses. Students may have up to two attempts to receive a C+ or better in BIO 223, and only courses with a grade of C+ or better within the past five years of being accepted to the program will be eligible to meet program requirements. Transfer nursing courses will be considered if the grade is C+ or better. The grade of nursing courses from other programs will be considered on a case-by-case basis. Students must submit a request for advanced standing from the Program Director for consideration of transfer to the Nursing Program. Transfer students will be required to take the one-day, noncredit LPN Transition course that is offered prior to the start of the fall semester.



for this course will be set by the college and will be the responsibility of the student. Satisfactory transfer students to receive credit for NUR 100 and advanced placement in the Nursing Program Nursing program in 4.5 semesters from enrollment in the first nursing course.

II. Information for Continuance in the Nursing Program

1. Students must receive a C+ or greater for each required nursing course. If the student does not receive a C+ or greater in a required nursing course, they may repeat the nursing course, however, only one nursing course may be repeated during the student's enrollment in the nursing program.
2. Students must receive a C+ or greater in BIO 107, BIO 108, and BIO 223. Students may repeat a course once to attain a C+ or better; prior BIO W or X grades are not considered a repeat but may negatively impact a student's progress in the program. Only courses with a grade of C+ or better within the past five years will be eligible to meet the requirement. Students are expected to have a C+ or greater in BIO 107 by the end of the first semester (traditional students) and BIO 108 by the end of the second semester (advanced placement students). Students are expected to have a C+ or better in BIO 223 by the end of the third semester. Students are expected to have a C+ or better in BIO 107, 108, and 223 by the time they complete the final semester of nursing courses. Failure to meet the requirements may prevent a student from continuing in the program.
3. Students who fail a nursing course are not guaranteed continued enrollment in the Nursing Program. If a student withdraws from NUR 100 their status in the Nursing Program will be reevaluated by the nursing faculty. If a student fails a nursing course, their status will not be guaranteed.
4. Students are eligible for one withdraw from a required nursing course during their enrollment in the Nursing Program.
5. Traditional students must complete the Nursing program in six semesters from enrollment in the Nursing Program.
6. A student who will not be enrolled continuously in the Nursing Program must request a Leave of Absence from the Nursing Student Handbook. A student will only be granted a Leave of Absence for a period of one semester. A Leave of Absence will be granted during the student's enrollment in the nursing program. During the Leave of Absence, the student will be moved from nursing to undeclared.
7. Nursing electives can be chosen from any NUR course not required in the curriculum.
8. Clinical experiences are provided in area health care facilities during day and evening hours and clinical rotations. PLEASE NOTE: Students may be required to travel an hour or more to a clinical site and may require transportation.
9. Clinical sections may be taught by adjunct faculty.
10. Unsatisfactory or unsafe application of theory in the clinical experience/laboratory may result in a student being removed from the program.

11. Basic Drug calculation skills will be taught in NUR 100. Evaluation and demonstration of proficiency will be required at the completion of this unit in NUR 100 and at the beginning of each major nursing course with a grade of C or better. Students will be provided with drug calculation practice web sites and resources which will be posted on Learn@Adirondack. Students must prepare for the applicable math proficiency test. Students who receive 100% on the math proficiency test will be exempt from the test. Students who fail to complete on the Clinical Evaluation Tool for that course. A student who fails to meet the 100% requirement on the math proficiency test after three (3) attempts will be required to participate in remediation activities and will be required to pass the proficiency test per policy for each nursing course.
12. All students are required to take the HESI Medical/Surgical Exam after completing NUR 102, 103, and 104. Students must take a comprehensive HESI Exit Exam prior to graduation. Students completing NUR 202 are strongly encouraged to take the NCLEX-RN Review Course offered by the college (January or May) to aid in their success with the NCLEX-RN. Review Course fees are borne by the student.
13. The State University of New York (SUNY) and SUNY Adirondack is committed to protecting the safety of students who participate in college-related programs and activities, whether on or off campus. A New York State Police Criminal History Check may be required by a clinical agency at the beginning of the student's Behavioral Health Clinical Experience. If a criminal history is identified, it can take up to six (6) months for a student to receive clearance. It is the student's responsibility to address issues that may be identified in the background check and get clearance and their participation in the program is deferred until clearance is received.
14. Articulation agreement(s) are in place that provide for a seamless transition for SUNY Adirondack students to a B.S. program of study.
15. Admitted students who have failed clinical or have been dismissed from the Nursing Program because of academic reasons may appeal the decision using the grievance procedure outlined in the Nursing Student Handbook. A student who restarts the Nursing Program after a period of two (2) years is treated as a new nursing student and must complete all core nursing courses.
16. Admitted students who have been dismissed from the Nursing Program due to failing NUR 100 or NUR 101 may petition to reenter at a later date using the procedure outlined in the Nursing Student Handbook.
17. Admitted students who have been dismissed from the Nursing Program due to failing NUR 100 or NUR 101 may petition to be reinstated back into the program using the procedure outlined in the Nursing Student Handbook. A student who is reinstated back into the program must successfully complete all core nursing courses, on the first attempt, and no withdrawals, to remain in the program. A student who reapplies and restarts the Nursing Program after a period of two (2) years is treated as a new nursing student. All decisions made by the Health Sciences Division relative to the Nursing Program will be final.
18. Any student who has been dismissed from the Nursing program will be automatically reassigned to a different major. Changes of major will be the responsibility of the student.
19. Students seeking re-entry into the Nursing Program must retake Nursing Courses older than two (2) years. Courses older than 5 years.
20. Beginning with nursing students admitted to the Fall 2018 academic semester, all admitted nursing students will undergo a national criminal background check and submit mandated annual requirements through a background check compliance agency. The cost of this background check and compliance tracker will be the responsibility of the student. The compliance agency will notify the Division Chair of the Health Sciences Division for any positive findings identified through this background check. This may preclude a student from participating in clinical experiences at affiliated agencies and the College may not be able to accommodate clinical placement. Successful progression in the Nursing Program is dependent on successful completion of clinical experience. A student's continuance in the Nursing Program. The College reserves the right to require an additional background check if a student is enrolled in the Nursing Program or when returning from an approved Leave of Absence. The cost of this background check will be the responsibility of the student.



21. For compliance with SUNY Policy #3200 - Admissions of Persons with Prior Felony Convictions, nursing students with prior felony convictions will be required to report to the Dean for Student Affairs and may be subject to review by the Felony Review Committee.
22. In the event that a Nursing Policy is changed/updated in the Nursing Student Handbook mid academic year, the updated policy in the Nursing Student Handbook will supersede the policy in the College Catalog.
23. Nursing Students are required to take a full semester of nursing courses once accepted into the program. Students elect to take just one seven (7) week course each semester. Exceptions may be allowed for those with significant absence.
24. Upon graduation, SUNY Adirondack nursing graduates will be prepared to take the NCLEX-RN. However, passing the NCLEX-RN is not guaranteed. Students are responsible for reading and understanding the RN license requirements they hope to practice in following graduation or if considering relocation.
